


# Sheep Worrying by Dogs Survey (March 2014)

580 survey responses from England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland


Have you ever had sheep attacked by dogs on your farm?

 79% of farmers who answered the survey had had sheep attacked by dogs on their farm.



How many times have you had sheep attacked by dogs on your farm in the last five years?

- The average respondent had had one attack on their farm in the last five years
- 32% of respondents had had five or more attacks on their farm in the last five years
- 12% of respondents had had ten or more attacks on their farm in the last five years
- Three respondents had had 200 or more attacks on their farm in the last five years





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



If this is a persistent problem on your farm, how many times a year do you experience attacks?

 58% of respondents described sheep worrying as a 'persistent problem'

Among respondents who described sheep worrying as a persistent problem:-

- The average respondent experiences one attack per year
- 14% of respondents experience five or more attacks a year?
   7% experience 10 or more attacks each year








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## What do you consider to be the main cause of dog worrying on your farm?

The five causes selected by the most respondents were, in order:


- Dog walkers not keeping their dogs on leads (58% of respondents selected this option)
- 2. Dog walkers assuming their pet will not attack stock (55%)
- 3. Dog walkers thinking chasing stock does not do any damage (36%)
- 4. Dog walkers not appreciating the financial value of livestock (30%)
- 5. Dog walkers assuming their pet will respond to command once they begin to chase stock (30%)



#### Thinking of your most recent attack...

#### ...where did your most recent attack occur?

- 60% of attacks occurred in private fields with no footpath
- 31% of attacks occurred in private fields with a footpath
- 5% of attacks occurred on common/open access land
- 2% of attacks occurred in a private field with footpath running alongside it / in adjacent field
- 1% of attacks occurred in other places, including the farmyard and lambing shed






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
## ...how many dogs were involved?

- The average attack involved one dog
- 37% of attacks involved two or more dogs
- 3% of attacks involved more than four dogs



#### ...how many sheep were injured?

- 96% of attacks led to at least one sheep being injured or stressed
- 14% of attacks resulted in ten or more sheep being injured or stressed
  There was one report of two-hundred sheep being injured/stressed in a single attack






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#### ...what kind of injuries were caused?


36% of attacks resulted in the death of at least one sheep - 27% of attacks resulted in at least one sheep being killed during the attack and 9% resulted in at least one sheep being put down after the attack



 63% of attacks resulted in invisible

injuries - 47% of attacks resulted in stress and 15% resulted in known abortion

40% of attacks resulted in dog bite(s) requiring a vet



# ... was there any follow up from the attack?

The most common response was the farmer speaking to the dog owner personally (54% of attacks resulted in this)

The second most common response was that the police and/or dog warden spoke to the owner (24% of attacks)




- In 15% of attacks, the dog(s) was destroyed as a result in 9% of attacks the dog(s) was destroyed on the scene and in 7% of attacks the dog(s) was destroyed after the attack
- 7% of attacks resulted in prosecution of the dog owner/the person in charge of the dog; 63% of these prosecutions were successful

...on a scale of 0 (no response) to 10 (very helpful), how would you judge the response of the police?

Contact ed contact police, 73% 27%

73% of respondents contacted the police about their last attack



The average rating of the response of the police was 4, although all possible ratings were given



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


...on a scale of 0 (no response) to 10 (very helpful), how would you judge the response of the dog warden?




Only 39% of respondents contacted their local dog warden about their last attack (see left), although it must be considered that not all areas have a dog warden

The average rating of the response of the dog warden was 3 (see right)



#### ...what was the financial cost of the attack to you?



The most frequent associated cost of a single attack (24% of respondents) was £200-£399

21% of attacks had an associated cost of £1000 or more

There was one report of a £10,000 incident



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
